Silver Jubilee a golden opportunity to reflect

An ancient Chinese proverb states, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step." "Many great endeavors start from very humble beginnings and if not for those first steps, they very well many not exist at all," shared Fr. Jeff Wocken SDS, USA provincial, during his opening remarks at the Silver Jubilee celebration of Jordan University College (JUCo) in Morogoro, Tanzania in March.

Those humble steps of mission in Southern Tanzania began in 1955 when the first Salvatorian missionaries were sent, and grew to include multiple parishes and mission stations in a variety of dynamic ministries from communications to technical education. By 1963, 34 Salvatorians were working in the area of Lindi and Tunduru-Masasi, and the first Tanzanian brother had completed his novitiate and professed his vows in the United States.

"These first steps were always in collaboration with others and often required correction and refinement," said Fr. Jeff. "The true value of these firsts is not in the people and acts themselves, but in the steps which followed, leading to what is today the Tanzania Pro-Province and Jordan University College."

JUCo had its humble beginnings in the early 90's when USA Salvatorian Brothers Donald Mauer and Bertrand Hanf were hard at work constructing buildings that would become the

Salvatorian Major Seminary. Fr. David Brusky SDS was named the first rector of the seminary. As the school matured, there were further changes in direction, some under the leadership of unit superior, Fr. James Weyker SDS, from the US. When it was time to form a local Salvatorian formation community in Morogoro under the Tanzanian Pro-Province, Fr. Dan Pekarske SDS, was chosen as the first local superior.

"JUCo has been a collaborative endeavor of several religious communities from its very origins," said Fr. Jeff. "Moreover, as the presence of American and European Salvatorians has decreased through the years, the journey of the Tanzanian Pro-Province and of JUCo has become increasingly reflective of a truly African Church and African Salvatorian presence in the world. It is my hope that the USA Province may continue collaborating with JUCo and the Tanzanian Pro-Province well into the future."

Welcome Home!

Having served six years as vicar general and general secretary to our international Society of the Divine Savior in Rome, Italy, Fr. Raúl Gómez has returned home. He has been appointed as the new president-rector of Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology (SHSST) and after a short sabbatical will assume the duties of this position in July.

Professing his first vows with the Salvatorians in 1982, Fr. Raúl was ordained to the priesthood in 1987. Prior to his term in Rome, Fr. Raúl had served nearly 25 years at SHSST in a variety of capacities including more than 15 years as director of Hispanic studies, which was one of the first programs of its kind in a seminary setting. His roles at the seminary also included service as vice rector and as vice president for academic affairs and director of intel-

lectual formation. Fr. Raúl has an MDiv, MPA, and PhD.

"Salvatorians have a rich history at the Seminary," said Fr. Raúl. "When I began in 1988 there were already Salvatorians on staff and others had studied there in preparation for ministry. Since then, about 15 members of the US Province as well as Salvatorian Sisters have served as full-time and adjunct professors. At one point there were more Salvatorians on staff than members of the order that owns and operates Sacred Heart!"

Prior to entering religious formation, candidate Greg Dougherty served in prison ministry for seven years at Warren Correctional Institution, a state prison in Ohio. He also lived and worked at a mission in Northern Kentucky serving the poor and marginalized. One of his passions has been working to spread the Message of Fatima, including completion of a 1,200 mile rowing expedition from Miami to NY in celebration of the Jubilee Year of Fatima. Greg has been ministering at St. Catherine's High School in Racine, WI during his candidature.

Greg says he felt very close to God throughout his youth, and shared that he first heard God calling him to the priesthood as a teenager. "I'm drawn to the Salvatorians by the charisms of the Founder, Fr. Francis Mary of the Cross Jordan," said Greg. "I feel called to religious life because of the strength found by community living. I hope to find the joy of living in a community bonded in the love of Jesus Christ through Our Lady."

Mass of the Divine Savior

Moved by the mission and ministry of their Salvatorian-led parish of Most Holy Trinity (MHT) in Tucson, AZ, Patricia Munsen, music director at MHT since 2005, and her son, Nicolás Munsen, together composed the completely original Mass of the Divine Savior, which was recently made available on a music CD.

Mrs. Munsen, her husband, Dr. Randal Munsen SDS, and their son, Nicolás Munsen have graciously donated the rights to the music and CD to the Society of the Divine Savior. USA Provincial, Fr. Jeffrey Wocken SDS, wrote the instrumental accompaniment parts to the Mass. He also contributed the original song, Free Me Lord, as well as his flute, guitar and vocal talents for the CD.

There are many beautiful Mass settings in publication but the trend since the new Mass translation came out in November of 2011 was to have all the Mass parts connected with the same musical theme. "It's a great idea so people can learn it quickly but it also tended to make all the parts of the Mass have the same feel. For us, Mass of the Divine Savior started with the Gloria," said Mrs. Munsen. "Nick and I wanted to take on the challenge of composing a Mass that had a recurring theme, but enough changes to reflect the intent within the different parts of the Mass." Written to be a joyful Mass setting, MHT has been using the Mass of the Divine Savior for the past four years and it is brought to life at every Mass by the MHT choir and congregation!

"We wanted to do something for the Salvatorians because they have, and continue to do so much for us," said Mrs. Munsen. "The Salvatorians were our driving force to record the music and secure the copyrights as a way
