SEVEN DECADES *of making a difference in the world!*

The Blackwood Campus of *Camden County College* opened in 1967. But prior to that, the campus had a very different twenty-year history – as *Mother of the Savior Seminary* – a boarding school for the education of future priests – owned and operated by the priests and Brothers of the *Society of the Divine Savior* – the *Salvatorians*. From 1947 to 1962, the seminary was a six-year school – four years of high school and two years of college. In the fall of 1962, the college classes moved to a Salvatorian college campus in Wisconsin, leaving the high school seminary to continue until the school’s closing in 1967. Over just that one summer, the campus was transformed into the beginnings of Camden County College.
